1: Sheffield Renewables Two Years on...

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When we were two, we were nearly new. Well for those involved, it perhaps doesn't seem that way, but Christmas 2009 marks Sheffield Renewables' second birthday. It has certainly been a busy time – our volunteer survey suggests that we have racked up 1000's of volunteer hours. So what do we have to show for it?

Well on the face of it, we are still some way from reaching that 'simple goal' we set ourselves at the start – 'a shiny bit of kit, in the ground, generating electricity.' And on the face of it, we still have the same three challenges as we did back then: bring a site to investment readiness, raise the capital and build a scheme.

The big difference between then and now, is that the ground work has now been done: we have a professional organisation, money in the bank, committed and capable volunteers, a clear sense of direction, good access to advice, and a growing support base. Our hydro projects are developing rapidly and we have a series of other options coming along as well.

2010 is set to be a big year for Sheffield Renewables. No doubt there is a lot of work still to be done, but if we maintain the commitment and effort shown through 2009, then that first scheme of ours, is not so very far away at all.

Sheffield Renewables is unlike any project I've known. Being involved makes me feel that anything is possible. And it is the people, who make it so special. Many thanks to everyone who has helped and supported us so far. Have a very happy Christmas!

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2: Pioneer Shares

Following our incorporation as an Industrial Provident Society, earlier this year, we are now able to raise funds by issuing shares. As a first step, we have launched a 'pioneer share offer'. We are running this through December. It is aimed at volunteers and local partners, who are already closely involved with our organisation. We'll keep you updated through December via our website.

Much as we'd like to open our doors to everyone, at this stage it is more important that we are sure that those involved fully understand the offer and the risks involved. We also need to keep the admin burden to a manageable level. We will use the money raised as operating capital, helping with cash flow. The move will build an initial investor-membership and demonstrate our ability to raise finance via shares. It is also a good way to test our admin systems.

Nobody should feel they are missing out. The move is intended to put us in a good position for 'the big one' in 2010, when we expect to run a major share offer in support of our first energy scheme. In preparation, it is really important that we continue to build up our pledge database. We have received over £20,000 in pledges since the summer. We encourage anyone who is interested in investing in Sheffield Renewables to sign-up. This is the best way to stay informed of important investor news.
